SOUTH CAROLINA'S LARGEST HIGHER EDUCATION SECTOR

Each year the System educates and trains over 147,000 South Carolinians through our credit programs (108,313) and continuing education programs (39,653).




GEOGRAPHICALLY ACCESSIBLE ACROSS THE STATE

Our colleges provide one of the most accurate pictures of a community in terms of its population, its demographic makeup and its business and industry focus.











SC TECHNICAL COLLEGE SYSTEM: HIGHLIGHTS

49% of all South Carolinians enrolled as undergraduates in South Carolina's public higher education attends one of our 16 colleges.

AFFORDABLE

Average annual tuition at one of our colleges is 39% of the average annual tuition at a four-year institution. Our colleges remain South Carolina's most affordable path to a quality higher education.

TARGETED

95% of our students are South Carolina residents. Nearly all our students are citizens of the state and choose to live and work in South Carolina after completing their education.

RELEVANT


93% of our graduates are placed in a job related to their field of study or are continuing their education.

This heat map depicts the recruitment needs for announced readySC projects across the state. In addition, there are several prospects and expansions not included.


This shows the number of South Carolinians our technical colleges will need to educate and train to keep a skilled, ready pipeline in place.





DUAL ENROLLMENT: HIGHLIGHTS

FY2025-2026 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

- PREPARING SOUTH CAROLINA'S WORKFORCE -

The System's recurring funding request is designed to enhance the ability of the System and its 16 colleges to meet workforce demand effectively. By increasing recurring funding, we can ensure that our institutions have the resources necessary to provide high-quality education and training that aligns with the needs of today's job market. This investment is crucial for preparing our students for successful careers and supporting our state's economic growth.

The System's request for an increase of \$5 million in funding for the Lottery Tuition Assistance Program (LTAP) will promote access to quality higher education and provide more per-credit-hour assistance. Nearly a third of technical college students rely on LTAP, and over 400,000 technical college students have benefited from the program since its inception.

The System's dual enrollment initiative request aims to make dual enrollment opportunities more Dual Enrollment Initiative (\$5.0M) accessible across the state. By allowing high school students to take college courses at little to no cost while still in high school, we are reducing financial burdens. We are also preparing them for the rigors of college work and equipping them with essential skills for the workplace.

Continue SC Workforce Industry Needs Scholarship (SCWINS) funding (\$95.0M) Maintain funding for these statewide technical college scholarship programs, which are designed to address workforce shortages and build a skilled talent pipeline for high-demand fields across the state.

Equipment for high-demand job skills training (\$25.0M) High-skill, high-demand jobs often require high-cost equipment to ensure what students encounter in the training lab accurately reflects what they will encounter in the workplace. Additional equipment funding effectively positions our colleges to meet this demand.

Continue funding for readySC[™] projects to deliver on commitments made by the state.
